PUBLIC WORKS



2019 Recap:

Thank you to all who attended the Public Works Open House on Oct 12th. Please visit our Facebook page - Village of Willow Springs Public Works - for information on upcoming events.

This past Halloween, we certainly got tricked by the winter storm that blew in. The public works crew worked hard to clear the mess (tree debris, snow, heavy rains) that the storms brought, and collected leaves in record breaking cold November weather.

We hope you enjoyed all the festive holiday decorations that our crew put up around the Village – all made possible by our Beautification Commission and generous resident donation team!

2020 Winter:

Public Works has purchased new liquid de-icing equipment that allows the street to be prepared 72 hours prior to snowfall with a liquid brine solution (salt, calcium chloride and beet juice.) This solution will prevent a bond from forming between the snow/ice and the street. The pre-treatment solution will reduce the amount of costly road salt usage, and unlike salt, will begin to work as soon as it is applied without water and at lower temperatures. Be aware that the beet juice may leave a tan tint on the lower portion of cars; but no worries, it rinses right off. The liquid brine will be utilized first on our hills, and then if the trial works well, as it is expected, usage will be expanded to other areas.

Parking on village streets is prohibited when snow levels reach 2 inches or more. It is illegal to shovel snow into the streets and please be cautious around snow plows/salt trucks, emergency vehicles and school buses.

Salting and plowing will be completed first on through streets, followed by side-streets, cul-de-sacs and then public parking lots, sidewalks and alleys. Public works cannot be called to clear private property or driveways.

Thank you in advance for your support this winter season as we shovel, plow and de-ice the Village.

<u>Do not bring electronics to Pubic Works</u>. Roy Strom Refuse Removal Service is now handling electronics pickup. Please call them at 708-344-5000 to schedule **free** curbside pickup.

Store large branches in your yard over the winter and Public Works will get them in the spring when branch pickup begins in April. If you hire a contractor to remove tree(s), then the contractor is responsible for removing the branches.

Contact Public Works when street lights go out so we can notify Com Ed and expedite replacement.

The Beautification Commission received a \$5,500 grant from the National Association of Realtors to be used to enhance the bus stop at the intersection of Willow Springs Road and Archer Avenue, and to create a community garden on a lot located at 105 Kazwell which was donated to the Village.

On October 26, fifteen community volunteers met at the bus stop and followed a design by landscape architect Larry Walsh that included leveling the hard soil and adding three tons of dirt to facilitate planting the bushes and hostas. Plans call for a retaining wall to be constructed on either side of the bus stop to prevent erosion. The project also includes a lending library, designed as a replica of the bus stop, to be constructed and erected at the site.

Trees have been cleared from the lot designated as the community garden. Commissioner Jason Buege of Streamline Landscaping will grade the property and determine how many plots can be accommodated. An automated drip irrigation system will be installed to irrigate the property. Benches and gravel walking paths will be placed throughout the lot. Residents interested in securing a plot may call the Village to be placed on a list for Spring, 2020 planting.

The Commission will reprise its very successful "Not So Serious Bingo" fundraising event on Saturday, January 25. Prizes and refreshments will round out a fun way to escape the cabin fever that sets in mid-winter. Please mark your calendars and watch for more details soon.

The Commission thanks the community for its support during the past year. Thanks also to Commissioners Linda Arra, Niki Chibucos, Robert Curran, Lucy Mierop, Bozena Murawski, Commission Chairperson Jan Posch and Trustee Melissa Neddermeyer.

IS YOUR ADDRESS VISIBLE?

If you had an emergency at your house, is your home address clearly marked so we could identify your house and respond in a timely manner? When someone has a heart attack, or a house is on fire, minutes make a difference! Your address should be visible from the street with a minimum of four inch numerals in a contrasting color. Reflective numerals really stand out at night. Keep an eye on vegetation, flags or other items

that might block the view of your address. Your address on the mailbox is a welcome addition, but don't forget to put the address on both sides. Ensure that the numerals a large enough to read from a distance and make sure to maintain it. Mailbox numerals are often worn out or falling off. Help us help you quickly! In an EMERGENCY, time counts.

POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

IL TOBACCO 21/CANNABIS LEGALIZATION

The Illinois law (IL Tobacco 21) prohibiting the sales and use of tobacco including vaping and e-cigarette products to youth under age 21 is strictly enforced by the Willow Springs Police Department. Similarly, the laws pertaining to the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act effective January 1, 2020 will be enforced by our officers.

With a record number of young people using e-cigarettes, it is important for users and parents to know the facts about vaping and understand that there is no safe way to use tobacco or nicotine. Quitting should be the goal.

Vaping devices that look like pens or flash drives with chambers or cartridges are the mechanism of choice, especially by the younger population, for delivery of nicotine and tetrahydrocannabinol (THC, the active psychoactive ingredient in marijuana). These devices are designed to heat chemicals to high temperatures for release as a breathable aerosol into the lungs and entry into the bloodstream. The devices hold THC or nicotine infused oils, waxes, dabs, and fillers (thickening/diluting agents, flavor additives, and vaper enhancement agents).

The CDC has issued warnings on the use of these products and related illnesses. Information on EVALI (e-cigarette or vaping product use associated lung injury) can be found online at www.cdc.gov.

Currently the FDA does not regulate vaping products. The amount and strength of nicotine or THC dispensed through these devices is difficult to measure, and more often than not delivered in high concentrations which can exacerbate the physical health risks (for example, compromised immune system, damaged organs, cancer). Studies have demonstrated that adolescents and young adults are especially vulnerable to the psychological or physical health risks that marijuana use poses, including impaired brain development (disruption of neural pathway that are required for optimal long term emotional and intellectual functioning, for example, coping skills). Also, within this age group of marijuana users, there is a higher incidence of addiction, psychosis, and progression to hard drugs.

Cannabis Prohibitions

The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act **prohibits** the use of marijuana products (THC) by individuals under the age of 21 and in the following locations:

- Any public place or space, including streets, parks, schools, bus stops, libraries, government and federally funded facilities such as banks and hospitals.
- In any motor vehicle, including public buses (transported cannabis must meet the permitted allotment and be maintained in a sealed container that is inaccessible while driving.)

- Near someone under the age of 21.
- Near an on-duty school bus driver, police officer, firefighter or corrections officer.
- Also, any person, business or landlord can prohibit use on private property. Illinois colleges and universities can ban marijuana use on their property.

Cannabis Permissions

llinois residents who are 21 and older may possess up to 30 grams of cannabis flower, 5 grams of concentrate, and 500 milligrams of THC in cannabis-infused products such as edibles (candies and brownies).

Community Engagement

We encourage active community participation by reporting violations and concerns to our department.

If you witness or know of e-cigarette (vaping) of tobacco, nicotine, marijuana, tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) products that have been given or sold to minors (under the age of 21), please contact the Willow Springs Police Department at 708-839-2732.

The Willow Springs Police are committed to:

- making our roads safe and free from impaired drivers
- discouraging youth from using drugs including nicotine
- monitoring and deterring unlawful marijuana sales, distribution, and advertisement
- responding to poisoning and toxicity incidents

The 2020 Census is accessible for everyone.

We're making sure that **however you choose to respond**—online, by phone, or by mail—that **the census is accessible**. You'll receive an invitation to respond **beginning in mid-March**. You choose how you want to respond.



You can respond **online** in English or in 12 additional languages. The online questionnaire is accessible, following the latest web accessibility guidelines. We'll also have a video in **American Sign Language** available to guide you through responding online.



You can respond by **phone** in English or in 12 additional languages. You can also respond in English by **TDD** at 844-467-2020.



By mid-April, we'll mail a **paper questionnaire** to every household that hasn't already responded. (Some households will receive a paper questionnaire along with the first invitation in March.)

We'll have **braille and large print guides** available online to assist you with completing the paper questionnaire.



If necessary, you can respond **in person** beginning in mid-May. Census takers will visit all households that have not yet responded.

We'll have census takers available who can communicate in **American Sign Language** and additional languages. When the census taker visits to help you respond, you can request that another census taker who communicates in American Sign Language returns, if you prefer.

If you prefer, you may also choose to have another member of your household interact with the census taker.

Responding is important. A complete count helps ensure that services like Medicare, Medicaid, social security, and public transportation can support those who need them.

Responding is safe. All of the information you share with us is protected by law and cannot be used against you.

Responding is accessible. We're doing everything we can to ensure the ways to respond are accessible for everyone.





Willow Springs Business Spotlight - Women Run Businesses


